

ANNUAL REPORT 2014- Mosman Park Primary

We are delighted to present the 2014 Annual Report for Mosman Park Primary School and Mosman Park School for Deaf Children. The two schools are co-located and work closely together to provide an enriched learning environment for all students. This Annual Report outlines our directions for the future and provides parents with specific information on the performance of each school across a comprehensive range of areas. The first section relates specifically to Mosman Park Primary School while the second part provides information relevant to Mosman Park School for Deaf Children.

This year has been an exciting and busy year for the students, staff and families at Mosman Park Primary School. Our enrolment numbers have continued to grow with a final enrolment of 350. This included 185 boys and 165 girls with 40 Kindergarten enrolments. The number of classes was maintained at 14 with the double streaming increasing for the first time up to Year 4.

Mosman Park Primary School was awarded the Syd Donovan Memorial Prize for Outstanding Primary School in the state-wide WA Young Writers Awards. This recognition was all the more exciting as the Awards attracted nominations from many of the private and government schools across the metropolitan and regional areas. Individually our students achieved great success across a range of literary events; these included WA Young Writers, Tim Winton Awards and the Now and Then Creative Writing Awards. Our students also featured prominently in the Town Of Mosman Park Art Awards. Our NAPLAN performance continued to show improvement with all tested year levels achieving close to or above the average in Reading, Writing, Spelling, Punctuation & Grammar and Numeracy when compared against All Australian Schools as well as our Similar Schools (designated as having a similar socio economic background). www.MySchool.edu.au

During Semester 2 students from Kindy through to Year 7 participated in a whole-school Artist in Residence Program. Talented artist Lucinda Crimson captured the imagination and creative talents of the students as she led them through a range of artistic mediums and experiences. The amazing results were on display for all to enjoy at the end of year Open Evening.

This year also saw the Mosman Park Schools implement a formalised Auslan as a LOTE program. The program was run in partnership with Shenton College, Shenton Deaf Centre and Belmont City College. Students in Years 5 – 7 participated in weekly lessons with highly skilled teaching by Patty Levitzke-Grey and Dr Karen Bontempo. The program supports our students in their ability to communicate with their Deaf and Hard of Hearing peers as well as providing a defined LOTE pathway for graduates to Shenton College.

Finally we would like to recognise the contribution of the stakeholders and members of our school community. It is only through these genuine and supportive partnerships that the student successes and whole school improvement that we have experienced can be achieved.

SCHOOL PROFILE - Mosman Park Primary




Mosman Park Primary School is in the heart of Mosman Park and enjoys strong links with the local community and parent group. The Primary School has been part of the local community since 1906 with Mosman Park School for Deaf Children relocating to the school site in 2002. The school reflects the multicultural mix of the suburb, with some students being the children and grandchildren of former pupils and others who are new to WA or Australia.

The Mosman Park Primary School student enrolment numbers have continued to grow with significant increases in our Junior years. This has meant the Primary School has been able to run a double stream across Kindy, Pre-Primary, Year 1, Year 2, Year 3 and Year 4.



THE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

Mosman Park Primary School provides a wide range of teaching and learning programs for students from Kindergarten to Year 7.

Specialist support teachers provide programs in the areas of:

- Music including an extension program for selected Year 6/7 students (Classical Guitar), Signing Choir for both Junior and Senior students, Performing Arts Group
- Science
- Physical Education
- Languages Students from Year 3 7 (Japanese), students from Kindy to Yr. 4 (Auslan Australian Sign Language), formal Auslan as a LOTE for students Yr. 5 7.

Further extension opportunities are provided through PEAC (Primary Extension and Challenge) for select Yr. 1, 2, 3 and Yr. 5-7 students,

OUR KEY OBJECTIVES FOR 2014

The Mosman Park PS Business Plan (2013 – 2016) outlines the Key Objectives which serve to guide our school operations. On a regular basis both the school staff and School Board review the progress which has been made toward meeting the Key Objectives. A formalised and comprehensive review of operations will be conducted by the Department of Educational Services (DES) in August 2015.

1. Successful Students

At Mosman Park Primary School we foster a learning environment which supports our students to achieve their full potential, to be happy and secure in themselves and to leave our school well prepared for the future.

- Development of whole-school Literacy and Numeracy Plans
- Introduction of iPad Program to support student learning, utilisation of Smartboard, computers.
- Classroom support timetabled and prioritised
- Additional support programs (Multilit, Minilit, Volunteer literacy) provided for students requiring additional opportunity to meet expected targets
- "Making Thinking Visible" implemented and supported across all year levels. Staff provided with professional learning and opportunities to share experiences.
- Teachers continue to focus on the establishment of classroom environments which have high
 expectations of student performance and which are supportive of the development of
 positive attitudes toward learning and behaviour.

2. Excellence in Teaching and Learning

Teaching and Learning at Mosman Park Primary School is supported by quality educational leadership and the provision of an environment which encourages, supports and builds staff capacity for teaching excellence.

- A new Leadership Structure introduced with designated Learning Team Leaders, Curriculum Area Leaders and Executive Team members. All teachers were involved and have enthusiastically embraced the leadership opportunities that have been offered.
- Curriculum Area Leaders worked collaboratively with team members to develop and support the implementation of revised Operational Plans across all learning areas including
 - o Enalish
 - Mathematics
 - o Science
 - History
 - Geography
 - o Digital Technologies
 - o Music
 - o Health and PE
 - LOTE

- All teachers have implemented and reported upon the Phase 1 Australian Curriculum areas (English, Mathematics, Science and History) and have commenced planning and implementing across other areas – Geography, ICT, The Arts, Health & PE.
- Teachers effectively communicate student progress and achievement through agreed protocols and practices.
- Workforce Development planning has been implemented and staff selection actioned according to identified need.
- All teachers have embraced the use of the AITSL Professional Standards as a basis for performance management.

3. A Safe, Supportive and Sustainable Environment

Mosman Park Primary School provides a safe and caring learning environment for students and staff, underpinned by a values rich learning culture that supports quality learning and positive behaviour. We strive to develop in students a commitment to care for and nurture a sustainable physical and natural environment.

- A comprehensive student, staff and community survey was conducted which included the national parent and student opinion items as well as survey items determined by the school community.
- Our school has developed an encompassing program of sustainability and encourages all
 classes to be active participants. Initiatives include the WasteWise and WaterWise programs,
 recycling, vegetable garden and frog bog pond.
- The school administration has fully engaged with the requirements of the new student-centred funding model and has ensured readiness for implementation in 2015.

4. Strong Community Partnerships

At Mosman Park Primary School we focus on developing strong and sustainable community partnerships which support the school in its endeavour to become a distinctive school with an excellent reputation in the local community.

- The School Board has continued to provide support and feedback to inform current operations and future direction setting of the school. Community awareness is being raised through regular attendance and reporting at the school's P&C as well as through newsletter articles.
- The Board has identified focus areas and formed working parties to support the focus of the School's Business Plan. This includes – Communication, Community Partnerships, Volunteer Program, Grants, Promotions, Alumni, Tax Deductible Funds.
- The formal implementation of an Australian Curriculum approved Auslan (LOTE) program has commenced in partnership with Shenton College. Students from Year 5 7 have participated in the program throughout 2014.






STUDENT PERFORMANCE

Student performance is collected and analysed in an ongoing cycle throughout the school year. Parents receive formal reports at the end of each semester as well as detailed NAPLAN feedback for students in Year 3, 5 and 7.

This NAPLAN (National Assessment in Literacy and Numeracy) data provides a key component of the school's data analysis. Student performance in 2014 continued to indicate strong overall progress. The Year 3, 5 and 7 cohorts all performed above or substantially above the average of All Australian Schools across all test areas (apart from Year 3 Spelling). The Year 5 cohort performed particularly well when compared to the Year 5 results from the previous year, while our Year 7's continued to perform strongly across all test areas. Analysis of NAPLAN data over the past five years (MySchool) indicates that the school based programs and priorities that have been implemented are proving to be very successful in developing strong student performance. This is particularly noteworthy over the past two years as the whole school planning initiatives for our Literacy and Numeracy programs come to fruition.



The following graphs compare the performance of students from Mosman Park Primary School with results obtained from Western Australian and Australian schools in 2013.

We also have a significant number of students achieving results in the top 20% of all students as evidenced by the table below.


SCHOOL SURVEY 2014- PARENTS, STAFF AND STUDENTS

A comprehensive school survey was conducted during Semester 1, 2014. The survey sought feedback from parents, students and staff around a range of key areas. These included the ministerially-agreed national parent and student opinion items as well as school identified priority items around the areas of Leadership & Management, Community Involvement, Curriculum and School Environment.


All parents were provided with information about the survey and a link to access the questions. The survey was completed by 59 parents (24% return rate). All students in Years 5 – 7 were provided with an opportunity to participate and 75 students completed the survey. The survey details were also provided to all staff members with 13 completing the feedback (62% Teaching and 38% non-Teaching).

As you will see below the feedback overall was very positive and supportive of the school and its operations. We were pleased that many of the respondents included additional information and comments and these, along with the graphed data below have been closely reviewed by staff and the School Board. The feedback, particularly around the area of Curriculum has been instrumental in guiding our school planning processes. Survey areas that were identified as being of concern have been discussed and improvement targets addressed through the school's current operational and strategic planning processes.


Parent Feedback to Mandatory National Parent Questions Part A




Student Feedback to Mandatory National Parent Questions Part A




Staff Feedback to Mandatory National Parent Questions Part A




Parent Feedback to School Identified Priority Areas – COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT




Parent Feedback to School Identified Priority Areas – LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

How would you like to see the school improve or develop?

- Higher academic goals in literacy and numeracy.

- Physical placement of some year group class rooms makes it difficult for children to interact with peers from the same year in playground. They are continuously playing with children in their class and not seeking out the other class's children.
- Better and more effective feedback.
- Information for parents on services available e.g. school psychologist.
- Availability of before and after school care.
- Encouragement of critical thinking and a greater celebration of academic success. Sometimes it feels mediocracy is celebrated more than high achievement in areas other than sport, where it is ok to excel.
- Community service activities for the students.
- There needs to be a greater focus on retaining students in the older years (by ensuring the teaching standards in those years are high).






Mosman Park School for Deaf Children

Annual Report 2014

School Profile

Mosman Park School for Deaf Children offers a bilingual, bicultural learning environment which provides a solid foundation for effective learning. Deaf and Hard of Hearing students are immersed in an Auslan rich environment which celebrates the diversity of two languages and two cultures. With an intense focus on language development, students use Auslan as their primary language to build their English and mathematics skills.

Deaf role models provide students with valuable access to, and understanding of Deaf culture.

Mosman Park School for Deaf Children works side by side with Mosman Park Primary School to create true inclusivity between the Deaf and hearing cultures. Auslan is taught to the hearing students of Mosman Park Primary, and with this common language, the children are able work and play side by side in the playground and during the afternoon mainstream lessons.



Auslan Sign Language

Our greatest focus is on language development. Students are immersed in Auslan sign language through all aspects of the curriculum and social interaction. Students receive appropriate linguistic support from interpreters, Deaf role models, and Teachers of the Deaf.

Auslan is also taught in the co-located Mosman Park Primary School as LOTE for the senior classes and Auslan story time for the junior classes.

The senior Deaf students are engaged in Auslan classes twice a week to strengthen and develop their skills.

Speech and Language

Mosman Park School for Deaf Children acknowledges that communication competency is an essential outcome for all of our students. Individual speech and language sessions are provided for our students on a regular basis.

Auditory access is imperative for our students. Teachers of the Deaf, in partnership with parents, encourage students to wear and use their hearing aids, cochlear implants and FM systems on a daily basis. Audiological equipment is checked regularly by the Teacher of the Deaf and children are assisted to become independent in managing their own devices.

Student Profile

Mosman Park School for Deaf Children currently has two classes operating with students from year one to year six. Students undergo intensive language and mathematics instruction during the morning in small groups. Every child enters the mainstream class for afternoon sessions, while two students were fully mainstreamed in 2014. Several students within the school have other special needs which require school support.

Student Attendance

Students come from a range of areas across the metropolitan area, utilizing the school bus services. During 2014, the school continued to work closely with families to assist students whose attendance rates are below 90%. New incentive plans have been initiated for implementation in 2015.

Student Performance

Parents received formal reports at the end of semesters one and two. Students in years 3, 5 and 7 participated in NAPLAN testing and families received detailed reports explaining their results.

2014 NAPLAN results revealed that two MPSDC year levels were at or above the state average while four were lower and one year level was much lower. Dedicated literacy blocks have been established to target student language development in 2015.

The Learning Environment

Mosman Park School for Deaf Children continued to provide children with a bilingual/bicultural environment in which to develop their language skills and celebrate Deaf culture. Students work in purpose built classrooms each morning, in small groups which allow staff to target specific individual needs. In the afternoons, students were integrated into the mainstream classes for inclusive curricular instruction.





Inclusive Education

Special events are always celebrated with the co-located school, Mosman Park Primary. Qualified interpreters give Deaf students and staff access to the events. This exposure to the Deaf language and culture also increases the understanding and empathy of the hearing students of Mosman Park Primary School.

School Survey

The analysis of the school survey is impacted by the small student population and the confines of responses. 12 families completed the survey out of a possible 13 therefore results are represented as a general analysis of data.

Families agreed that teachers at this school expect their child to do their best rating 4.4/5.

Parents said that they can talk to the teachers about their concerns rating 4.3/5

A similar rating was received where families believe their child is making good progress at this school and that student behaviour is well managed at this school.

My child likes being at school - 42%




50% of parents agreed with the relationship the school community, the leadership of the school and the overall standard of education achieved at the school.

They strongly agreed they would recommend the school to others.


School Finances


